There's an old phrase that's been used in the Church for hundreds, if not thousands, of years that's worthy of pondering as a new year begins. That phrase is "Lex orandi, lex credendi." Translated from the original Latin, this means "the law of prayer, the law of believing."

To put it more to the point, what the phrase is really getting at is this: the way you worship/pray/act affects what you believe and vice versa.

Consider a few examples of this in other areas of life first. An athlete who doesn't take practice seriously will begin to believe that practice isn't important. Likewise, an athlete who does believe practice is important will give a great effort even at practice, thus maximizing its benefits.

An artist who takes time to make beautiful works of art will see the great value of beautiful artwork. On the other hand, an artist who believes all art is subjective and there is no such thing as an objectively beautiful piece of art will not make an effort to pursue objective beauty.

In this same way, then, the way we worship really does affect what we believe and what we believe really does affect the way we worship. This is a helpful realization that can lead you to ponder why we do what we do in worship and where our beliefs inform our worship as well as where our worship informs our beliefs.

For instance, why do we read from the Bible at every service? On the one hand, reading from the Bible every week teaches us that the Bible is the Word of God and that it's value cannot be surpassed. On the other hand, our belief that the Bible is the Word of God makes us crave hearing from it whenever we gather together.

Why do we sing during worship? On the one hand, singing teaches us that God loves to hear our praises, especially as we sing about what He has done for us. On the other hand, our belief that God encourages us to sing His Word and to sing about His mighty works opens our mouths to make a joyful noise.

Why do we treat things in church, like the altar, the communion elements, the baptismal font, etc., with extra reverence and respect? On the one hand, this extra respect teaches us that these things are holy, that is set apart for God's purposes, and that God Himself is present to use these things for our good. On the other hand, our belief that God is actually with us in worship, even bodily with us on the altar via communion, encourages us to honor, respect, and rejoice that God is with us in church to give us great and wonderful gifts.

Now, think about all of this in another way. What would happen if our practices change? How might our beliefs begin to differ? If we only read from the Bible once a month, what might that make us believe about it? If we never sang anything during church, how might we feel about all the singing in God's Word? If we treated church and the things in the sanctuary in an informal way, what conclusions might we draw about God's presence in that place?

The way we worship really does affect what we believe, just as what we believe affects how we worship. It's good for us to think about this and consider this connection so that we may always be growing in the faith, receiving the gifts which God so loves to give us.

As you come to worship, then, ask yourself that question. Speak about it with your family too as well as other members of the church. How does our worship inform our beliefs and how do our beliefs inform our worship? The great thing about this is it always leads us back to Christ who is the sum and substance of both our worship and our beliefs.



The January Book of the Month is Lutheran Prayer Companion. Here is an excerpt from the introduction to the book: "Although there is already such a large number of prayerbooks that to add to them by way of the present volume might seem to some superfluous, yet not a few of those now available are of rather poor quality, while others contain bad material mingled with the good, and still others are not comprehensive. For this reason, faithful pastors have up to now been quite at a loss as to which book they might in good conscience recommend when those entrusted to their charge ask them for a good prayerbook covering all kinds of situations. The collectors of the present Lutheran Prayer *Companion* hope that they have thus met a need which has become increasingly urgent. The collection before you, designed not for church use but home use, is not only as exhaustive as possible, but also includes only those prayers which both confess the doctrines of God's Word purely and possess a language of genuine devotion devoid of anything naturalistic, diseased, or enthusiastic."



Book of Concord Corner

"Our churches teach that people cannot be justified before God by their own strength, merits, or works. People are freely justified for Christ's sake, through faith, when they believe that they are received into favor and that their sins are forgiven for Christ's sake. By His death, Christ made satisfaction for our sins. God counts this faith for righteousness in His sight (Romans 3:21-26; 4:5).

So that we may obtain this faith, the ministry of teaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments was instituted. Through the Word and Sacraments, as through instruments, the Holy Spirit is given (John 20:22). He works faith, when and where it pleases God (John 3:8), in those who hear the good news that God justifies those who believe that they are received into grace for Christ's sake. This happens not through our own merits, but for Christ's sake.

Our churches condemn the Anabaptists and others who think that through their own preparations and works the Holy Spirit comes to them without the external Word.

Our churches teach that this faith is bound to bring forth good fruit (Galatians 5:22-23). It is necessary to do good works commanded by God (Ephesians 2:10), because of God's will. We should not rely on those works to merit justification before God. The forgiveness of sins and justification is received through faith. The voice of Christ testifies, 'So you also, when you have done all that you were commanded, say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty" (Luke 17:10). The Fathers teach the same thing. Ambrose says, 'It is ordained of God that he who believes in Christ is saved, freely receiving forgiveness of sins, without works, through faith alone." (Augsburg Confession, articles IV, V, and VI)
