Congregation as Mission

The term "mission," as it's used in a church setting, might make you think of many different things. Some will hear "mission" and immediately think of missionaries who are sent around the world to preach the Gospel. Some will hear it and think of their local food pantry or homeless shelter. Some may even hear it and think of evangelizing their friends, neighbors, and community.

Certainly, each and every one of these are part of the Church's mission. There's no doubt about that. And thanks be to God for all the different ways that His mission is seen and carried out in this world.

But one thing most people won't think about when they hear the term "mission" is their own congregation. For some reason, the local congregation doesn't register in people's minds as part of the mission of the Church. Yet, it absolutely is.

In fact, the local congregation is the primary form or shape of God's mission. After all, God's mission is to seek and save those who are lost in their sins. To do this, He preaches His Word to sinners, urging them to repent and turn back to Him. Then, God gives His forgiveness to them through His Word and Sacraments so those repentant sinners may receive life and salvation.

Where else is this seen so clearly and so wonderfully as it is in the congregation? Our life together in our congregation isn't about our shared location or our shared values, beliefs, lifestyles, and so on. Our life together in our congregation is all about the mission of God to call us to repent and to bring us salvation by bringing us the forgiveness of sins in His Word and Sacrament.

This is why we love our congregation. Because here God comes to us to bring us salvation. Day after day. Week after week. Year after year. Generation after generation.

This is why we support our congregation. Because we desire for this mission of God to continue among us. So, we give our tithes and offerings. Our friendship and encouragement to one another. Our faithful attendance in worship and Bible study.

This is why we care about our congregation. Because God cares enough about us as His people here in this place to give us through His means of grace everything we need for this life and the life of the world to come. So, we work on the property. We pray for each other. We give our time in service to one another.

Sadly, when we don't see our congregation as a mission, these things can start to become untrue for us. When we see our congregation as something that belongs to us or as something that we don't really need since we already believe, we can cease to love, support, and care for it. Which is really to say, although we don't like to think of it this way, we cease to love, support, and care for the salvation that God is at work in and through the congregation to bring us.

In our world today, many congregations are suffering for exactly this reason. They've long since ceased to understand that they are the mission of God to the members of the congregation and to the community around

May this not be the case for us. Rather, may we rejoice to see and to understand the congregation God has given us as His mission to us. As His means of bringing us His forgiveness, life, and salvation. And may this knowledge stir us up to love, support, and care for our congregation even more, knowing that our love, support, and care is really for the mission of God that we may be saved.

Greetings. Rejoice in the day the Lord made. As the calendar turns to another page, we are reminded of these words from a recent Epistle reading: "13 Who is wise and understanding among you? By his good conduct let him show his works in the meekness of wisdom. ¹⁴ But if you have bitter jealousy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast and be false to the truth. ¹⁵ This is not the wisdom that comes down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, demonic. ¹⁶ For where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there will be disorder and every vile practice. ¹⁷ But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere. 18 And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace. 4 What causes quarrels and what causes fights among you? Is it not this, that your passions are at war within you? You desire and do not have, so you murder. You covet and cannot obtain, so you fight and quarrel. You do not have, because you do not ask. ³ You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, to spend it on your passions. ⁴ You adulterous people! Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Therefore whoever wishes to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God. ⁵ Or do you suppose it is to no purpose that the Scripture says, "He yearns jealously over the spirit that he has made to dwell in us"? ⁶ But he gives more grace. Therefore it says, "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." ⁷Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. ⁸Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded. 9 Be wretched and mourn and weep. Let your laughter be turned to mourning and your joy to gloom. ¹⁰ Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will exalt you." (James 3:13-4:10)

GENERAL INFORMATION

Book of the Month: The Book of the Month will be available in the Parish Hall library. The October Book of the Month is *Will the Real Church Please Stand Up?: 7 False Churches* by Matthew Richard. Here is an excerpt from the book: "Separating children from the rest of the congregation during worship is a relatively new occurrence, originating in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. While there is much history around this issue that can and should be debated, perhaps a more important question looms: Why? Are children removed so that they can be catechized and taught the Christian faith at a level suitable to their educational capacity, or are they removed as a means of childcare to allow adults to enjoy a professional church service without the interruptions of noisy children? And beyond the 'why' of children's church, we should also ask whether it's necessary at all. That is, should the family be divided at the door of the church? Even though some churches have good intentions, the family is the core unit created by God. The world spends much time during the week dividing the family on the basis of systematic age segregation. However, do actions like this strengthen or weaken the family?"


FROM THE OFFICE
