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Easter Every Sunday

Good news! Easter isn't over! Far from being just one day in the year, the Church celebrates Easter for 50 days, from the day of the Lord's resurrection to the day of Pentecost. This Easter season has come to also be called, then, the great 50 days.

Yet, even that season only scratches the surface. Maybe you've heard this before, but it's often said that every Sunday is a little Easter. Every Sunday is a celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead.

This is more than just some saying, though. Or, to put it another way, this statement is pointing you to a better understanding and confession of what happens whenever we gather together in worship.

To begin with, saying that every Sunday is a little Easter reminds us that the reason we gather and the focus of our gathering is Jesus Christ crucified and resurrected. We don't gather to hear a motivational speech or to get good life advice or life hacks. We gather because Jesus Christ died on the cross and rose again from the dead for us.

That leads into the next point. In worship, we receive all of the gifts of God. Those gifts, though, were won by Christ's death and resurrection. Everything that God gives us goes back to that. Everything that God does for us flows from it. So, every Sunday we celebrate Christ's resurrection and the gifts that He has won for us because of it.

The day of the week is also important here. It was no accident that Jesus died on a Friday and rose again on a Sunday. The reason why goes back to creation. God takes seven days to create. Our calendar stills bears a confession of this, noting especially that the week begins properly with Sunday.

Friday, therefore, is the sixth day of the week and reminds us of the sixth day of creation. On that day, God created the animals, but most importantly He created man and woman. Christ dies on a Friday, because by His death man is being recreated. By His death man and woman find new and everlasting life.

Then, Jesus rises on Sunday, the first day of the week, showing how His resurrection ushers in this new creation. He makes all men and women knew even right now because the new creation has already begun and it began with His resurrection.

The earliest Christians recognized this and decided to worship on this special day. The third commandment is to remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. That is, God commands us to have a day set apart from the rest of the week to hear His Word and receive His gifts. Thus, there's freedom in which day to observe as the Sabbath, as the day to gather together in worship.

So, those early Christians made it a habit to gather on Sunday, the day of the Lord's resurrection, the first day of the week, the day of the new creation. Because, after all, this is exactly what's going on in worship. God comes to us through His means of grace to give us the gifts of Christ's death and resurrection so He may join us into the new creation.

All of this, and even more than space allows here, is behind this phrase that every Sunday is a little Easter. May this fact lead us all to appreciate first what our Lord is doing for us in worship and second how it all is tied back to the most important event in all of the world. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Alleluia! Christ is risen!

"By the Mercies of God"

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. (Rom. 12:1)

These words from Romans 12:1–2 set stewardship in its rightful place. Here, St. Paul shows us stewardship in its proper relationship to the Lord, and what stewardship should look like in our faithful service to Him. These are good words for the faithful steward to consider on a regular basis.

Notice from whence comes the appeal! The mercies of God are the defining factor, shaping both the steward and all subsequent actions. It all begins with the mercies of God. This beginning is not some esoteric, philosophical consideration either. The mercies of God, poured out upon the faithful steward, find one anchor point in human history. The mercies of God are on full display at the cross.

On Calvary, our Lord Himself, bearing human vesture and carrying our sins and griefs, lowered His holy, crownencircled brow. But Christ's death on the cross should not be taken as a sign of defeat. Rather, by the mercies of God, Christ's death grants fallen sinner/stewards like us new life! We trace this journey each year through the season of Lent and Easter. Amid the bloody sweat of Gethsemane, the injustice of the kangaroo court in Jerusalem, the ruthless and spineless acquiescence of Pilate, and the gore of Golgotha, we see exactly what the mercies of God look like.

Everything Jesus endured should have been ours. When Jesus is forgiving and promising paradise even as He is being forsaken for us, we see true mercy! This mercy is what redefines who we are, a redefinition which happens when we are baptized. Once dead and deserving of condemnation, in Baptism we are given new life in Christ. This new life in Christ changes how we see ourselves. It also changes how we see the world.

By viewing ourselves and the world in this new way, we can start to live out St. Paul's oxymoronic call to be "living sacrifices." We know from the Old Testament that sacrifice means something dies. The bulls and goats, lambs and rams came at a high price. In the waters of Holy Baptism, something also dies — the old Adam. In our Baptism, we have already died and have been raised. This is the how the mercy of God works on us. In the dying and rising, we can be a daily sacrifice that has been made holy and acceptable to God. This is not by our action, but by His!

Paul talks about this as our "spiritual worship." The Greek word here is leitourgos, which is where we get the word "liturgy." It is this view of the mercies of God that forms our daily stewardship, and our daily worship. The mercies of God define all you do in the course of a week as a steward of the Gospel worship. It is not limited to the Divine Service. In fact, the mercies you receive in the Divine Service are what you carry out to share with the world as your living sacrifice. After spending time with Jesus, you bear His image and His glow out into the world that is full of darkness and death. You have been made holy and acceptable to Him for the purpose of showing His mercy to others. This is what makes our "daily liturgy" so important. As we live and serve, and as we seek and share forgiveness and life with those around us, we are walking billboards of God's mercy in Christ.

This is what your stewardship puts on display. None of it is about you. It is about Jesus in and through you. You can't get to this by your own efforts. It is only about the mercies of God. These mercies are the treasure that you steward in your daily life of worship!



Missions: This year we will be supporting a variety of missions. The missions we have supported include Clarity, Lakeview Ministries, Orphan Grain Train, Tiffany Smith (missionary for Lutheran Bible Translators serving in Tanzania), a seminary student, and our youth group. If you would like to submit a name of a seminary student or any other organization for consideration this year, please speak to an elder or to Pastor. Thrivent Action Teams: If you have any Thrivent policies or products, you are eligible for two action teams a year. Book of the Month: The Book of the Month will be available in the Parish Hall library. The May Book of the Month is *The Magdeburg Confession: With Historical Introduction and Annotations* translate by Christian Preus. Here is an excerpt from the book: "Grounded in the timeless teachings of the Scriptures and the Augsburg Confession, the Magdeburg Confession both transcended the crisis of 1550 and also provided prudent advice for that same emergency. It reaffirmed the historic Christian teachings confessed by Luther's followers at the Diet of Augsburg in 1530 and further articulated a theology of political resistance on the basis of Scripture, natural law, and both sacred and secular history. Just as a Christian should gladly hear the pure preaching of the Gospel and gladly receive the pure administration of the Sacraments but avoid those congregations that teach or practice contrary to God's Word, so also a citizen is obligated to obey civil governments that punish the evildoer and protect the innocent but resist when, in the name of civil authority, a tyrant punishes the innocent and praises the evildoer."


